At Clonmel Assizes on Wednesday, John Murnane was tried
under several indictments for robbing the mail from Pethard
and Cashel to Clonmel and Dublin at the hill of Ardgecha,
near Clonmel, on the 24th of Jan. 1815—and also for again
robbing the said mail at same place on the 30th Jan. following
—and for having in his possession, in this county, Bank of
Ireland post bills stolen out of said mails, knowing the same
to have been stolen. The several indictments were capitaf.—
After the jury had retired to consider of their verdict, Mr.
Scott, one of the Crown Lawyers, employed on the prosecu-
tion, addressed the bench, observing, that if the prisoner was
acquitted of that part of the indictment with the actual
robbery of the mails, it would be incorrect to convict him on
the other indictment, as the notes were not found in his pos-
session in this county, and he could be indicted on that fact
in the county where the offence occurred. The jury were
thereupon called up—the circumstance was stated to them from
the bench, and they acquitted the prisoner on both indictments.
He was ordered to be transmitted to Cork for trial, and sent
off for that destination the next day (Thursday). The offence
is capital.

Michael Hogan, Thomas Hogan, Joseph Condon, John
Bourke, James Fahy, Wm Ryan, Malachy Donovan, Oliver
Wyse, James Donovan, and Michael Donovan, were indicted
for firing at Patrick Connors at the fair of Kilsfeacle in July
last, and for rising and appearing in arms by day. The
prisoners were acquitted on both indictments.

On Thursday, John Heenan, was tried for the murder of
Patrick Kennedy, at Ballinbassy, near CloghJordan, on the 1st
Dec last. Acquitted.

James, Michael, William, Cornelius, and Edmond Ryan,
were next put to the bar, charged with the murder of Michael
Burke, at Cappaghmurra, on last Patrick's Day, and also for
a riot and assault. The prosecutors not appearing, the pri-
soners were acquitted.

Wm. O'Donnell was then put to the bar, charged with the
murder of Mr. Geo. Robbins, of Hymenstown, on the 29th
of May, 1814. Acquitted, but held over on another charge.

Thomas Flinn, Martin Flinn, James Phelan, and Patrick
Carroll, charged with the murder of James Welsh, at Boris
Heigh and for a riot and affray, were acquitted, there being
no prosecution.

Wm. Reordan, Edward Ryan, James Ryan, Denis Brian,
and Wm. Brian, for the murder of Cornelius Ryan, at
Cappaghwhite, and also for a riot and affray—No prosecution
—Acquitted.

Joseph Ryan, Patrick Molloy, Michael Burke, Edmond
Purcell, and John Long, for burglary. Acquitted, for want
of prosecution.

Wm Ryan and John Ryan, for firing at Michael Burke,
at Knockforla—no prosecution—acquitted.

Wm. Quinlan and Mary Quinlan, for burglary and felony
at the house of Darby Noonan, at Salloughhead—no prosecution
—acquitted.

Patrick Burke, for stealing a mare, the property of Patrick
Tobin, of Freshford was convicted, sentence not passed.

Francis Young convicted of illicit distillation, was sentenced
to 12 months' imprisonment, and a fine of 20l. The amount
of fines demanded by officers of the revenue, for illicit
distillation, on and near the banks of the Shannon, in this
county, is not far short of 14,000l.

Yesterday morning Tobias Ryan and John Birmingham
were tried and convicted of the murder of James Spain, near
Boris Heigh, on the 26th of Nov. 1811; sentence was
passed upon them forthwith. The testimony against them was
clear, and admitted of no doubt.

John Grace was indicted for the murder of W. Meagher,
near Nenagh, eight years ago, and also for a riot and assault.—
The prisoner was acquitted of the capital indictment, though
we may fairly say on that he narrowly escaped. He was
found guilty of manslaughter. Sentence not yet passed.

Thomas Carey, for the murder of W. Coffy, at Newport.
No prosecution—acquitted.

Monday night, J. Maher, was convicted at Clonmel, for
the murder of Wm. Baker, Esq. and sentenced to be hanged—
It was supposed several others concerned in the foul deed
would be put on their trial on Tuesday.

CLONMEL, APRIL 6—Our assizes are going on. No-
thing particular occurred until yesterday, when two men were
convicted of a murder committed in Roscrea, near five years
since. Several acquittals. On Monday a number will be
tried, (say fifteen) for the murder of Mr. Baker of Lismacue.
It is expected that the Judges will not leave this until Wed-
nesday. A very large and highly respectable meeting took
