The bill was then gone through, and ordered to be read a third time on Monday next.

Kilkenny, April 5. On Sunday morning last, a number of persons assembled at Lisnattigue, in this county, where they planted two cannon, and commenced a brisk fire on the house of Lawrence Hacket, of Sportsville, Esq; whereby Mary Hayes, a servant of Mr. Hacket's was killed; the next morning the same party set fire to two stables, a barn, and a cow-house, the property of said Mr. Hacket, which were all consumed: and yesterday morning they drove off a great number of cattle the property of Mr. Hacket aforesaid.

After some business of course the House of Commons adjourned at six this afternoon till the 29th inst.

Mr. Orde having recently declared in the most explicit manner in the House of Commons, that no progress whatever had been made in the Portugal business, it is hoped the momentous affair will not, as usual, be suffered to lie over another session, but that it will be agitated as soon as a full House can be procured.

On Sunday night the gibbet on which Jameson hung in chains, was again cut down, and the body, after being stripped of the Irons, just covered with earth, and left on Gallows-hill. The posts of the gibbet were carried down the hill, and thrown into the river.

On Thursday night last the Earl of Milltown gave a most splendid and elegant entertainment, which surpassed any thing of the kind here since the famous ball in Augier-street about thirty years ago. The supper rooms were adorned with the greatest taste and magnificence, one particularly, after the manner of Vauxhall, with different kinds of shrubs and flowers representing a beautiful harbour, hung round with variegated lights, which through the shade, had a most delightful effect.
