In reference to this subject, the attention of all interested to the Laws relating to the sale of wine and 4th Wm. 4th. chap 68, entitled "An Act for the better regulation of the Laws relating to the sale of wine and spirits in Ireland:—" And be it enacted, that no Person selling or licensed to sell Wine, by Retail, to be drunk or consumed in his House or the Sale of Spirits, Wine, or Beer, nor shall any Person sell or consume Spirits, Wine, or Beer, nor shall any Person sell or consume any other place, at any Time between the hour of Seven of the Clock in the Night and Seven of the Clock in the Morning, or at any Time before Two of the Clock on any Sunday, Good Friday, Christmas Day, or any other Day appointed for a Public Fast or Thanksgiving, any Person who shall keep his House or sell or shall sell Spirits, Wine, or Beer, between the hour of eleven of the Clock in the morning and seven of the clock in the morning of the clock in the afternoon on Christmas Day, or any Day appointed for Thanksgiving, such Person shall be deemed a separate offence, and shall be deemed and considered and punished as an offence."
