The politive affurance given by the French will animate the one party, and the requisition of the King of Prussia that the Emperor will ftand neuter in the dispute, indicating a fettled purpose in him to attempt to reinstate the Stadtholder in his rights by arms, will spirit up the other. Every thing feems to cry havock, and the dogs of war are ready to be let flipped. It appears, however, beyond a doubt that Holland will be the stage on which France and Pruffia are determined to try their strength, and in the end it must become an appendage to either the one or the other. In the mean time the Mynheers have, in order to ward the blow, made their news writers throw Frederic into a fit of illnefs, from which it is impossible he can recover; perhaps next mail they will kill him; but it is possible he may convince them to their cost that he is still alive. What conduct the Emperor will purfue, is difficult to fay; the election of a King of the Romans must probably make him temporize till he has carried that point; but it cannot be imagined that he will remain an idle spectator when fo important a game is playing in his neighbourhood. The Austrian as well as the Prussian Eagle will endeavour to come in for his share of the prey; and as, should a war break out, he will evidently be able to cast the balance on which fide he pleafes, he will no doubt provide in the best manner, for his own interest. Perhaps by this interference he may awe both Potentates into a composition, and Holland may be difmembered with as it tle bloodshed as Poland was. In the mean time the British Ministry has a very difficult part to act.
