### Approval by Chamber of Commerce.

Mr M. D. Shaw, president, presided at a special meeting of the Limerick Chamber of Commerce last evening, called *inter alia* for the purpose of considering the Shannon Scheme and its effect on Limerick.

There were also present—Messrs E Lloyd, vice-president; F J Cleve, Senator J P Goodbody, J Loughrey, J Murphy, J Costelloe, J G Angley, E Stevenson, A Barnett, J F Egan, J Lay, A O'G Lator, J Quin, and G R Ryan, C.E., with the Hon Sec, Mr J F Power.

A letter of apology for inability to be present, owing to illness, was read from Mr S O'Mara.

After a discussion on the Shannon Power scheme, Mr Lloyd proposed the following resolution—"That the members of Limerick Chamber of Commerce strongly approve of the Shannon hydro-electrical scheme, as most important to the future development and prosperity of the Irish Free State, but that before the necessary legislation is passed the Chamber feels that the details of the scheme should be placed before the Oireachtas."

Mr J Quin seconded the resolution, which was passed unanimously.

### Irish Club

At a largely attended meeting of the Irish Club last night, Mr T J Loughrey presiding, a resolution was adopted approving of the Shannon hydro-electrical power scheme as a means of furthering industrial development of the country through the medium of cheap native power.

### Support From Co-operative Creameries.

At a Conference of Co-operative Creameries held in Limerick, Mr John McCormack, Dromba, residing, Mr Clifford, Secretary, referred to the Shannon Scheme and its great possibilities for the development of the country. A resolution was unanimously adopted congratulating the Government on the introduction of the Scheme, and pointing out that cheap and adequate power is necessary for the industrial and economic development of Ireland.

### OBITUARY.

#### Mr. Daniel S. Doyle.

Deep regret was expressed in Limerick yesterday, at the announcement of the death, unexpected as it was, of Mr Daniel Simson Doyle, Assistant Registrar-General, and a member of an old and highly-esteemed city family. The sad event took place at his residence, Wilson Terrace, Dublin, on Thursday, after an illness of some weeks' duration. He was the third son of the late Mr Daniel Doyle, solicitor, Limerick, and was about 55 years of age, and a bachelor. He was admitted a solicitor in 1893, when he was appointed assistant to the Registrar-General.

Mr Doyle was educated at the Sacred Heart College, Limerick, and at Tullabeg, from which latter institution he took the degree of B.A. and LL.B. in the Old Royal University. He was a member of the Clongowes Union, and took an active part in the work of the Clongowes Social Club. He was Honorary Secretary to the Statistical and Social Inquiry Society, and was engaged in several philanthropic movements, particularly in the work of the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He was a member of the Royal Dublin Society and of the Zoological Society.

Mr Doyle was one of the Census Commissioners, a body specially set up by statute to carry out the Census of 1911, the other members being Sir William J. Thompson and Sir Edward O'Farrell. Mr Doyle rendered good service to the dependents of sailors and soldiers during the war. He was a courteous and conscientious official, and a man of a very amiable and unassuming disposition. His brothers are Judge Charles Doyle and Mr James A. Doyle, solicitor, Limerick, both of whom, together with his sisters, were with him when he died.

At the city District Sessions yesterday Mr Flood, District Justice, referred to the death of Mr Daniel S. Doyle, solicitor, Assistant-Registrar-General. He said Mr Doyle was a member of a well-known Limerick family, with whom he desired to express sympathy and condolence, in their bereavement.

Mr J S Gaffney, solicitor, joining in the expression of regret said he was at College with the late Mr Doyle, and he felt personally very much his death. He was a fellow student of the deceased at the Crescent College, Tullabeg, and the University.

The remains of the late Mr Doyle will arrive in Limerick this evening from Dublin, at 6 o'clock, and will be taken direct to St Michael's Catholic Church. Funeral to-morrow after 10 o'clock Mass to Mount St Lawrence.

#### Mr J. Johnston, B.A.

We regret to record the death of Mr John Johnston, B.A., Headmaster of Villiers Endowed School, Limerick, which took place on Tuesday at Coleraine, County Londonderry. The deceased gentleman took ill shortly after the school had begun work after the summer holidays, and was laid up for a couple of months, after which he resumed duty, only to collapse still more seriously. He went North some three months ago, and had since been living with Mr George Steadman in Coleraine. For some time past hopes were entertained of Mr Johnston's recovery, but last week he became rapidly worse, and passed away on Tuesday, as stated. He leaves a widow and daughter to mourn his loss, and the sympathy of numerous friends in Limerick and elsewhere is extended to them in their hour of trial. Mr Johnston was well known and highly esteemed in educational circles. He took honours degrees in Classics in the old R.U.I. He was a strenuous worker and a most capable teacher, and during his long term of office, something like 30 years, as Headmaster of Villiers School he turned out many brilliant students, who later on occupied important positions in professional and commercial life. Mr Johnston was a most amiable and courteous gentleman, and his premature demise has been heard of with keen regret by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.
