### WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, March 28th—The numerical register of entries was something less than last week, numbering 121 head, including drafts of really choice heifers, as well as promising and nicely bred dairy heifers. There was a strong attendance, also shipping interests. The market was favoured with beautiful weather, which gave a bit of colour and richness to the "coats" of the heifers; trade opened rather quietly, as the earlier lots consisted of some secondary heifers, which did not appeal to buyers; these were tedious and difficult to place. Nicely bred promising heifers were wanted and bid for, and made around late rates; customers were present wanting choice heifers, with the required recommendations for dairy purposes, and willing to give best rates; these were in active demand, and drew sharp competition in the ring; no difficulty in placing promising heifers with the appearance of milk. Choice heifers met keen competition at the higher rates, with a strong demand for the coloury short legged heifers, on which there was a run. Brisk demand for young cows with substance and quality; this class is scarce. Choice and promising cows enquired for and sold easily at full rates. All round proceedings had a good swing, the higher rates of recent markets being well maintained. Top price for in-calf heifers went to Mr. Thomas Campbell, Morelands, Clonlara, at £36 10s., the runners-up being Mr. M. Power, Railway Hotel, Limerick, and Mr. John Stokes, Milford, Kildimo, at £36 each. Top price for dairy cows went to Mr. J. J. Murphy, Newmarket-on-Fergus, at £40 10s. Choice heifers, £33 to £36 10s.; promising, £27 to £32 10s.; ordinary, £22 to £26 10s.; dairy cows, choice, £30 to £40 10s.; promising, £27 to £29; ordinary, £24 10s. to £26 15s. Throughout the day business was firm and buoyant, winding up with a successful finish and good clearance.—Wm. B. Fitt & Co., Auctioneers.
