MR. ROBERT HOLMES.

The death, which we announce with deep regret, of Mr. R. Holmes, took place at his residence, Athlunkard House, on Thursday of last week. He had not been in the best of health for a considerable time past, but continued to attend his business affairs. He was eldest son of the late Mr. R. Holmes, and brother of the late Doctors Patrick and J. Holmes, of Killaloe and Scariff, and of the late Mr. Wm. Holmes, C.E., of Parteen. The deceased farmed extensively and was a well-known judge of dairy stock of which he always maintained a large herd. He was a successful breeder of bloodstock. He was a man of very charming disposition, affable and charitable. His death will be deplored by his numerous friends and sincere condolence offered to his widow in her great loss.

MARKET.

Wednesday, April 5th—Cattle—Considerable increase in numerical strength; an excellent show of beef, for which there was good demand; sold readily; top rates unhesitatingly paid, and handy weights placed easily. Buyers in full attendance. Well fed young cow brought a free sale. In beef section business was much the same character as last week, with healthy tone; brisk competition for lots with quality; secondary and old cows met a dull trade. Scarcity of strong and forward stores which did not meet as good a market as last week, unless for useful feeding bullocks of secondary descriptions tedious and difficult to place. Heaviest entry of yearlings for some time, including a number of drafts of choice heifers and bullocks; well bred coloury yearling heifers were in brisk demand. Proceeding in this section were marked with a much healthier and firmer tone, and a readiness on the part of buyers to invest, with a slight hardening tendency in prices. Nicely bred yearling bullocks were readily bought up. Good all round selling trade in this section of the market. Mr. John Kirby, Raheen, Ballinacorney, obtained top price for five heifers £17 1s.; steady demand for useful lots, and good clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £31 10s. to £37 10s.; second run, £24 15s. to £29 5s.; fat cows, best, £31 to £37 10s.; second run, £20 10s. to £27 5s.; old, £10 15s. to £18 5s. Two year-old bullocks and heifer £16 to £18 10s.; second run, £13 10s. to £15 15s.; yearlings, best, £15 to £17 1s.; second run, £11 to £13 17s. 6d.; small, £7 7s. to £10 3s.

Sheep—Decrease in numbers, but a full entry and a good show; trade not as active as last week; buyers showed a cooler disposition and value position easier; realisation not as ready in some cases vendors stood out for recent top rates, which buyers were not willing to concede; previous top rates not repeated. Nicely fed hoggets sold freely. Ewes quiet trade. When business settled down there was fast steady exchange, with a good clearance of Market for Easter lambs; average supply of nicely fed lambs in strong demand and readily sold. Fat middle weight, 120/- to 135/-; small, 107/6 to 115/-; noggets, best, 120/- to 131/-; second run, 75/- to 87/6; fat lamb best, 77/6 to 90/-; second run, 52/6 to 65/-—Wm. B. WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, April 4th—Entry for to-day market figured out about the same number as last Tuesday, with more choice heifers, including a number of high grade; also plenty of useful and promising heifers; the large and representative attendance present parted freely for the class required, which gave to business a "swing" and activity and kept things moving at top rates, there being no hesitation in making selections, and when the heifer of true dairy type came into the "ring" she attracted keen competition, and the buyer had to pay for her; choice and promising heifer came in for special attention, and proportionately drew more money; care in selection and bringing out well repaid vendors. Two outstanding roan heifers the property of Mr. T. J. Campbell, Morelands, Clonlara, and Mr. J. Lillis, Clounanna, Patrickswell, caused a sharp rally between keen judges, and made the high price of £40 each, the runner-up being Mr. James Keane, Coolderra, Kilmore, at £38. Business throughout the day was marked with activity, stability and cohesion; it was evident there were plenty of buyers for the "real" dairy heifers; high grade heifers in strong demand, and readily bought up. Prices were maintained on the higher level, with a very satisfactory wind up and clearance. Choice heifers, £35 10s. to £40; promising, £28 10s. to £35; ordinary, £21 to £27 10s.
