At the fair of Ballingarry on Monday, there was a show of stock, prices not encouraging. Milch cows averaged £7 to £12; In-calf Heifers, £7 10s to £8; Strippers, £6 to £9; fat Cows rather scarce, £8 to £11; two year old Heifers and Yearlings in good condition, the former from £4 10s. to £7; the latter from 15s. to £4; store sheep, from 18s. to 24s. a piece; store pigs dull, at 29s. to 32s. a cwt.; store pigs, 17s. to 22s. a piece.

There was an abundance of prime curd salmon in market yesterday at 4d. per lb.

The following appeared in part of last impression:)

Lord Abinger, Chief Baron of the Exchequer, died yesterday morning at Bury St. Edmunds. Lady Abinger his Lordship's physician left Bury for town immediately after. The remains of his Lordship will be removed on Tuesday. The present Lady Abinger was formerly Mrs. Ridley, the widow of the late Rev. Mr. Ridley, of Ockley-green, near Ripley, whose husband was a descendant of the celebrated Protestant martyr, John Ridley.

The vacant Lord Lieutenancies of Westmoreland and Cumberland have both been conferred on Lord Lonsdale. The repeal of the stamp duties on newspapers has been carried in the Chamber of Deputies, Paris, by a majority of 6, the numbers being, for the motion 146; against it, 140. The proposal was strongly opposed by the Minister of Finance on behalf of the Cabinet, on the ground that the revenue could not spare so large a sum as that raised by the duty.

John Lawrence for the murder of Mr. Solomon, the Chief Officer of Brighton, was hanged at Horsham on Monday.

(LIMERICK CHRONICLE) have letters from St. Vincent, to the 12th March. Head quarters of the 23d Regiment will shortly relieve the head-quarters of the 24th, at St. Vincent, and also the detachments at Guiana and St. Lucia. The service of the 46th Regiment in the West Indies, has nearly expired. It is expected the various detachments will be relieved by the 23d Fusiliers, and assembled at Barbadoes, previous to their removal to Canada. The Adjutancy of the 23d is still vacant, Ensign and Adjutant Sharpe having died of fever, on the 20th February, after an illness of only three days, leaving a widow and four children. Paymaster Corcoran is performing the duties of Adjutant, by order of Col. Sir Richard Doherty, the Governor of St. Vincent, until an Adjutant is appointed to the corps.

Head quarters of the 85th landed at Barbadoes the 10th of March from Antigua.

The Apollo sailed from Jamaica on the 9th of March for Quebec and Halifax with the 60th Rifles, who had been ordered to land at Newcastle, and as Jamaica continues healthy, the 48th Regt., which succeeds the 60th, had not been attacked by fever.
