We stop the Press to announce the arrival at our Office, BY EXPRESS, of the London Papers of Monday: which will not arrive in Dublin by the regular course until to-morrow.—The COURIER announces that a vessel from Oporto had arrived at Guernsey, and brought intelligence that Massena's rear guard of 8000 men under Ney, had been cut off.—The next official accounts will in all probability confirm this intelligence.

The Courier attaches strong credit to this gratifying intelligence.

**Reported success against Massena's rear.**

Accounts have been received by Government this morning, from the Prince de Bouillon, Governor of Jersey, stating that a trader arrived there on the 11th from Oporto, which she left on the 31st ult. that she had brought the important intelligence of Lord Wellington having, by a rapid and dexterous movement succeeded in cutting off Massena's rear guard under Marshal Ney, amounting to 8000 men, the whole of which were made prisoners.—This is the only account that has been received, and we are inclined to attach credit to it, for it will be seen by the Gazette of Saturday, that the allied army was to be collected on the 28th at Celorico, where the rear guard of Massena's army was on the preceding day. We know that Ney commands the rear guard, and as the distance from Celorico to Oporto is only eighty miles, intelligence from the army to the 30th might easily reach Oporto on the 31st. But another letter from Jersey mentions the vessel to have sailed from Oporto on the 4th, and that the success over the enemy was on the 31st. We shall care little about the dates, provided the facts be confirmed, as we have every reason to believe it will be, perhaps in the course of the day.

We feel ourselves called upon to contradict that part of the statement, respecting the fire which broke out on board the turf boat at the Long dock, on Sunday morning last, as given in one of the papers of this city on Wednesday, viz.—“*But by the attendance of St. John's Fire-Engine, &c. the flames were got under.*” —As it was not the Fire Engine of St. John's parish that was used at said fire, but (as we before stated), the Fire-Engine of the Atlas Assurance Agency, in this city, which (happily for those persons whose property has been thereby saved from the most imminent peril) was promptly brought to the spot, at a very unseasonable hour, by Mr John Carroll, the company's Agent here, and used with effect.—When individuals exert themselves from motives of humanity, to alleviate the distress of their fellow creatures, we deem it worse than injustice to deny them the fair acknowledgment due to their disinterested services.—(See Advertisement of thanks to the Agent in our Advertising columns).
