CLOMBS. APRIL 15.—On Thursday night a groom of Capt. Meyrick's, (Aid-de Camp to Gen. Lee.) threw himself out of an upper window in the Gen. house, and literally dashed his brains out. He got out of bed without being missed by a fellow servant who slept in the same room and nothing was known of the circumstance till morning, when his body was found on the flagway under the window.

A Coroner's Inquest was held by the Worshipful the Deputy Mayor on the body and a verdict was returned that he threw himself out from the window in a fit of insanity.

Tuesday morning, at low water, the body of Mr. James Murrin, a respectable farmer, of Ballinglau Waterford county, was found drowned off the Parade of Waterford. His death appears to have been accidental, occasioned by the excessive darkness of the night. It is highly probable that he walked over the quay the night before. He has left a large family to lament his loss.

Brigade Major Crawford received the Lord Lieutenant's positive instructions to dismiss from the Roll of the Neale infantry those men who, upon one occasion (as appeared on a trial at the last assizes of this County personated threshers at night, in order to quiz some of their brethren of the corps.—*Waterford Mirror.*

On Tuesday, part of the 2d battalion of the 59th regiment marched through Dublin, on their route to Fermoy, from whence they shortly expect to be sent to Portugal.

Last week six companies of the Antrim regiment marched from Aughtacloy for Cavau and Bellurbet, where they expect to remain for some time.

The 76th regiment have changed their quarters from Fermoy to Kilkenny.

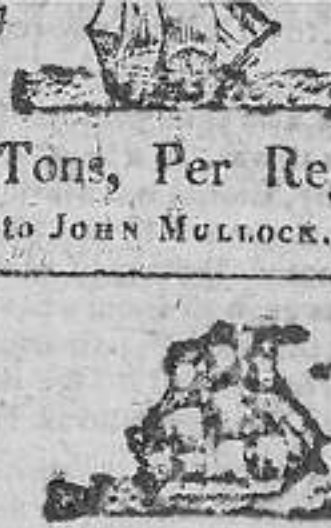
