

The Lord Lieutenant and Council, on Friday, withdrew the Insurrection Act from the Baronies of Upper Ormond, Lower Ormond, and Owey and Arra, in the County of Tipperary.

Mr. Algar, Landing Surveyor of Customs at this Port, is, by the Hon. Board, ordered to Drogheda. Mr. Shaw, Landing Surveyor of Derry, is ordered here.

Dr. M'Hale, Roman Catholic Archdeacon of Killala, Professor of Dogmatic Theology in the Royal College of Maynooth, and Author of the celebrated Letters of "Hierophilos," has been lately appointed, by the Holy See, Bishop of Marmia, in Thrace, and Coadjutor to the Right Rev. Dr. Waldron, of Killala.

The Ordinary Visitation of the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Ossory is to be held at the Cathedral Church of St. Canice, Kilkenny, on Thursday, the 5th of May next.

The County Limerick Agricultural Association, at a Meeting at the Linen-Hall on Saturday, came to a resolution to disapprove of Sir Henry Parnell's Butter Bill, and to instruct the County Members to give it every opposition in their power.

The High Sheriff of the County Carlow convened a Meeting of the Landholders yesterday, to petition Parliament against any alteration in the present Corn and Butter Laws.

The Grand Lodge of Freemasons of Ireland have issued a circular, dated the 7th Inst. directing the different lodges to forthwith congregate the members, resume the masonic labours, and disseminate friendship, charity, and brotherly love, as the late prohibitory Act, relative to private Societies, does not comprehend Freemason Lodges.

The Ennis Races are already announced to take place early in July next.

The plan of Mr. Thomas L. Pain for establishing a general manufactory in Cork, for the employment of poor children, and for apprentices, has been approved of.

Mr. Robinson is now in the County Cork, making arrangements for embarking the free settlers for Canada.

The former Bank-House of Messrs. Riall at Clonmel, was purchased last week by the Provincial Banking Company.

A new line of road is to be formed between Waterford and Dungarvan.

The laying down of the Gas Pipes is extended to the Irishtown.

The Lady Shannon Steam Packet is undergoing a thorough repair, and will commence plying between this and Kiltrush, about the first of May.

A Church is ordered to be erected at Castlehaven, County Cork.

A Dispensary has this week been established at Conna, County Cork.

Mr. Corry, Secretary to the Linen Board, and Mr. William Marshall, Inspector-General of Ulster, are summoned to attend the Committee on the Linen Trade

The Rev. Mr. Hay, of Londonderry, has been summoned to attend the Parliamentary Committee.

There will be a Ball and Supper at the Castle of Dublin on the 28th instant, to celebrate His Majesty's Birth-Day.

On Monday, the Dublin Mail Coach from hence broke down on George's-Quay, being obliged to deviate from the usual course, owing to the interruption arising from the laying down of the Gas Pipes—the delay was little, another coach being immediately sent to replace it.

The troops in the Garrison are to be reviewed at Newcastle on Saturday next, being the King's Birth-Day.

On Monday, Thomas P. Flyn, Esq. late in the commission of the peace for the County Cork, discovered in a field, in the vicinity of Millstreet, a number of pikes, swords, and other destructive weapons, supposed to have been deposited there by the insurgents, after their defeat at Newmarket and Carriganimi by the military.

On Sunday evening, a man named Hogan fell into a bog-hole at Abane, and perished. He was rather an idiot, and subject to fits.

Saturday night, a small thatched house in the rere of Glentworth-Street, was consumed—the proprietor conceives that it was maliciously set on fire—the former tenant was dispossessed, a few days previous, by a law process.

Thomas Kean died from a desperate beating he got near Mullinahone on Sunday night, and one of the assailants, Edward Prendergast, has been committed to Clonmel Jail.

A roan poney, belonging to a poor man near Mullingar, was stolen from Churchtown, a few nights since.

Monsieur Alexandre is now performing in Cork.

A most singular discovery was made last week at Kiltrush, in removing a box of oranges from the Two Brothers, which lately put in there in distress, one large orange was observed to be completely hollow, and in it found a nest of bees.

This experienced Officer died at a very advanced age, having served under their late Majesties George II and III, as Assistant Quarter-Master General in the War-Office, London. He was the author of the celebrated Road-book now in such general use in England.
