COAL PERMITS

The Minister for Supplies announces that
holders of permits authorising the purchase of
coal may purchase this fuel between this date
and the 30th April, 1944, on the following
basis:—

TYPE OF PERMIT	MAXIMUM QUAN- TITY OF COAL TO BE SOLD DURING APRIL.
<i>Culm for Lime Burners.</i>	Sales and deliveries may be made against permits in quantities as heretofore.
<i>Coal for Blacksmiths.</i>	Sales and deliveries may be made against permits in quantities as heretofore.
<i>Coal for all other classes of Industrial users.</i>	Sales and deliveries may be made against current permits up to the maximum amount authorised for purchase in the month of April, 1944.
<i>Anthracite for Domestic Cookers.</i> (Aga, Esso and other proprietary models for which allowances of coal have hitherto been authorised).	Sales and deliveries may be made up to a maximum of (a) one-eighth of the total quan- tity specified on the per- mits or (b) the undrawn balance of the quantity auth- orized by the permit
<i>Other coal and/or turf for cooking purposes.</i>	whichever is the lesser. Sales and deliveries may be made up to a maximum of one- quarter the quantity of coal and one-half the quantity of turf authorized to be drawn under permit in the months of April-May, 1944.

SUPPLIES OF ANTHRACITE ARE TO
BE SOLD OR DELIVERED ONLY TO THE
HOLDERS OF PERMITS SPECIFICALLY
AUTHORISING THE PURCHASE OF
THIS TYPE OF FUEL AND THEN ONLY
IN THE LIMITED QUANTITIES INDI-
CATED ABOVE.

This arrangement is of a purely temporary
nature designed to mitigate the hardship
created by the present situation, and it should
be clearly understood that it will not be
possible to continue allocation on this basis
after the 30th April, 1944.

Arrangements to deal with the situation as
from the 1st May are being completed and,
pending a further announcement no useful pur-
pose can be served by enquiries to the Depart-
ment of Supplies. Permit holders should,
therefore, refrain from communicating with the
Department by telephone or otherwise.
