DEATH OF LORD GUILLAMORE.

We are concerned to announce the demisc of the Right Hon. Standish O'Grady, Lord Viscount Guillamore, at the family residence, Roekbarton, in this County, at eleven o'clock, on Monday night last, when he departed this life, after an illness of long duration, and much suffering. His Lordship is succeeded in the title and estates by his eldest son, Col. the Hon. Standish O'Grady, who represented this, his native county, for some years in Parliament, and is married to a daughter of the Hon. Berkley Paget, niece of the Marquess of Anglesey. The late Peer was called to the Irish Bar in Michaelmas Term, 1798, an eventful period of his country's history, and he rose to distinction upon those high qualifications, natural and acquired, which he enjoyed in an eminent degree above most of his then distinguished forensic cotemporaries. He was a man of superior mind, and mixed but little in the angry tumult of political agitation, but having filled the high office of Attorney-General was elevated soon after to the dignity of Chief Baron of the Exchequer, where he presided for several years with consummate ability, and finally retired in January, 1831, the reward of his arduous labours in the public service being a peerage and pension for life of £3,500. His lordship married the sister of the late John Waller, of Castletown, Esq. formerly representative in Parliament for this county, by whom he has a numerous issue, Lord Guillamore, as a judge, surpassed all his learned brethren on the bench in that quick and almost intuitive perception of law and fact, which he was known to exercise with the utmost advantage in the mazy labyrinths of the most intricate and elaborate case. He was a great favorite on circuit, and peculiarly happy in summing up with clearness and brevity the wearisome details of a long trial. His address to a jury was short, but always perspicuous and pertinent, therefore sure to afford satisfaction, and to expedite public business. The Noble Lord, so eminent as a judicial functionary, was no less distinguished in domestic life for those kind offices, which as husband, parent, and friend, he gladly administered under occasional relief from the more urgent duties of his Court. The remains of the noble and learned Peer will be interred to-morrow in the family cemetery, at Rockbarton, in this county, convenient to his residence.
