WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET

Friday, April 25th—There was a substantial rise in supplies, with a fair proportion of heifers and cows, but did not include as many choice heifers as last week. There was, however, up to 100 heifers and cows, generally being of a promising and useful class to be seen from. There was a strong attendance, especially from a distance, with shipping agents operating strongly; all in quest of the best showing dairy qualities; this description of ready and willing purchasers, with a keen sale. Business opened with an extra vigour and active tone; promising and choice heifers were keenly competed for; prices showed a decided advance according to quality; dairy proprietors require heifers nicely light-out, with breeding and the essential "points"; the smaller type of thick heifers of quality and condition were also in great demand, and in some cases made more money comparatively than the bigger heifers. The supply of choice heifers is lessening each week of the season advances, so that parties requiring this stamp ought not to put off buying long. There was a decided impetus to the sale of in-calf cows, springers and milchcows, which gave a jump to values. Throughout the business was firm and buoyant, winding up with a successful finish and practical clear-up and marked the biggest turnover and best for the year. Mr. James O'Grady, Duxbury, Rathkeale, topped the market with an extra choice heifer at £38, the runner-up being Patrick Fitzpatrick, Kilmore, Limerick, at £36. Top price for dairy cows went to Mr. Frank Vaughan, Lanahrone, Corbally, Limerick, at £36 10s. In-calf and calved heifers,

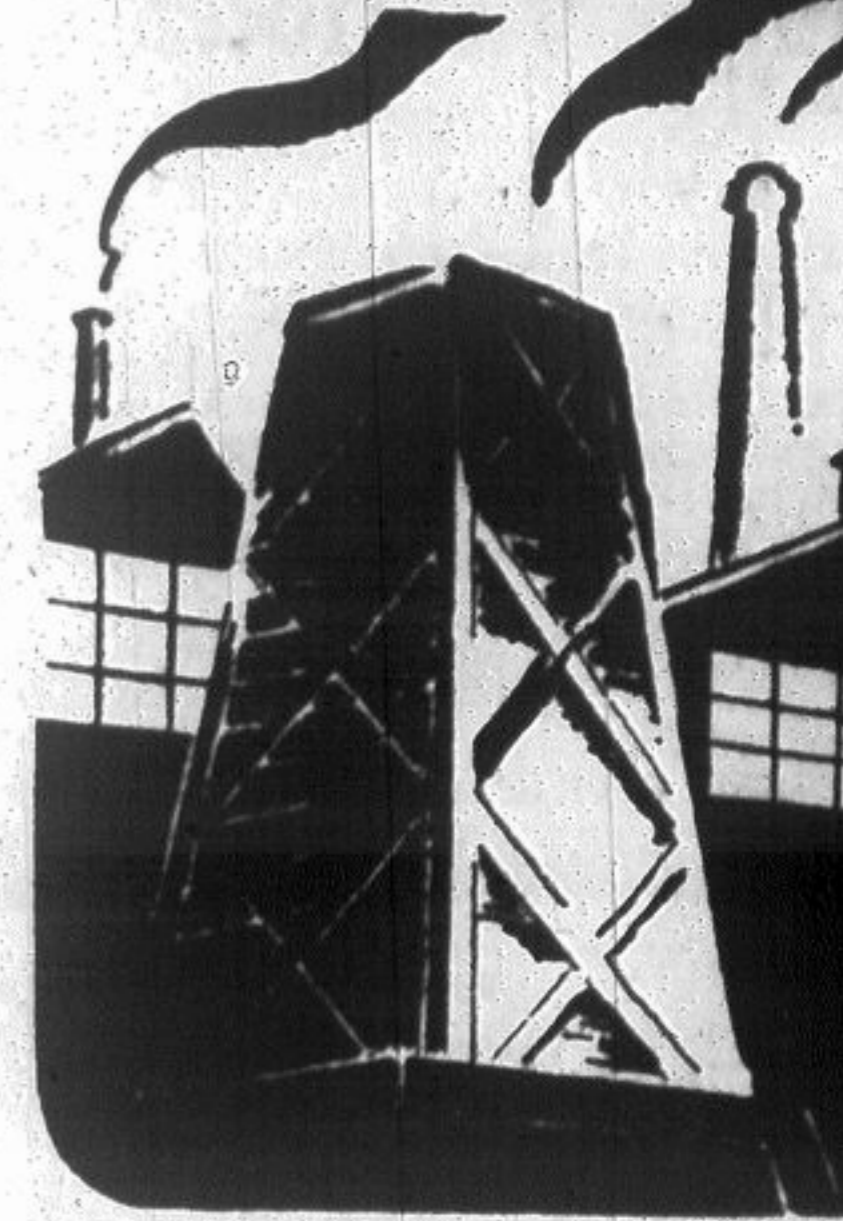
