FRIDAY, MAY 10th.—£50 for 3 and 4 years old, 3 years old, 6st. 7lb.—4 years old 8st.—2 mile heat

SATURDAY, MAY 11.—Sweepstakes of 5 guineas each (to which the Steward adds 60%) for County of Limerick bred hunters that never won a Racing Plate, and that have been fairly hunted last season—4 years old 10st.—5 years old 10st. 10lb.—6 years old 11st. 7lb.—aged, 11st. 13lb.—2 mile heats.

MONDAY, MAY 13th.—£50 for 5, 6, and aged—5 years old, 8st. 2lb.—6 years old, 8st. 11lb.—aged 9st.—3 mile heats.

TUESDAY, MAY 14th.—Sweepstakes of 5 guineas each, to which the Steward adds £50, for all horses that have been fairly hunted the season before, and that never won a Racing Plate—weights the same as in the County Plate.—3 mile heats.

The yeomen had but one round of ammunition, which having accordingly expended, they were driven to retreat toward Kilkishen, where they were soon resupplied. On their return from that place, the rioters appeared sensibly alarmed, and soon took to flight.

Monday last, the Clerk of the Peace, for the county of Kerry, received from his Majesty's Hanaper office, a supersedeas for the discharge of three gentlemen of that county, from their commissions of the Peace.
