LONGFORD.

REPORT upon the Proposed Municipal Boundary of the Borough of Longford.

A PERSON, authorized by the Sovereign of the Town, pointed out to me the Ancient Limits. reputed Boundaries; in many places they are very indefinite. It does not appear that any are prescribed by the ancient Charter, or by what authority the present are assumed.

Longford is the Assize Town of the County. It is a Borough, but does not Description of send a Member to Parliament. It is situated about 64 Miles North by West THE TOWN. from Dublin, 20 North of Athlone, and 23 West of Granard. There is a very large Market for Grain; great quantities are exported by the Royal Canal, a Branch of which comes into the Town. The small River Crumlin divides the Town, a part of which is in the Barony of Ardagh and part in that of Longford. The Town is well built, and is increasing rapidly in extent and wealth.

In 1831 the Population was 4,516; since then it is supposed to have much Population. increased.

A Tax of $5\frac{1}{2}d$. on Houses of 20 l. and upwards, $4\frac{1}{2}d$. on from 10 l. to 20 l., Local Rates. $2\frac{3}{4}d$. on those of from 5l. to 10l. is levied for watching and cleansing. The Town is not lighted.

The County Cess is levied by Cartrons, all varying in number of acres. The County Rate. Corporation contains eight; five on the North or Longford side of the River pay 61. 6s. 6d. per cartron, and three on the South or Ardagh side of the River pay 61. 8s. 11d. per cartron, as their share of the whole sum levied this Assizes, viz. 9,223 l. 5s. 7d. A sum of money is presented for in the general amount of the County for deserted children, which is paid to the Parish Officers.

The following Boundary is proposed, as embracing a sufficient area for any probable increase of the Town, viz.:-


From the Point (1) where the Stream which divides the Glebe and Town Proposed Parks joins the Crumlin River, Southwards, along such Stream to where it Boundary. crosses the Edgeworthstown Road (2); thence, Westerly, in a straight Line to the Canal Stable (3) about Two hundred and twenty Yards South of the North End of the Canal Basin; thence to the Point at which a Stream crosses the Roscommon Road (4) about Three hundred and fifty Yards from the Main Street; thence, Northward, down said Stream to its Junction with the Crumlin River (5) about Three hundred and thirty Yards West of the Bridge; thence in a straight Line to the North-west Angle of the Horse Barrack Wall (6); thence in a straight Line to the North-west Angle of the Gaol Wall (7); thence in a straight Line to the Gateway of the Artillery Barracks on the Mullagh Road (8); thence, Eastward, up the Mullagh Road to a House on the East Side of the Newtown Forbes Road (9) now occupied by James Plunket; thence in a straight Line to the Point first described.
