We stop the press to announce the arrival of this day's mail, with the London papers of Tuesday by express.

Government have received more detailed accounts of the operations in Italy. They are all satisfactory. One of Murat's columns, which he commanded in person, advancing towards Occhio Bello; a second towards Ferrara; a third under Pignatelli merched upon Florence. The Austrians in the first instance fell back; Murat advanced close to Occhio Bello, where the Austrians had thrown up a tete de pont. Murat made two attacks upon it on the 8th and 9th, but was repulsed in each; He fell back upon Carpi.

Thither Marshal Bianchi followed, and attacked them on the 11th. The conflict was long and bloody, but at length the enemy were driven out of the place, with the loss of 12 Officers and 500 men. Reggio was next abandoned, and they took the route of Modena.

The column which proceeded against Ferrara, had begun operations against it, when on the 12th, the Austrian Generals, Mohr and Niepping, attacked it, drove it off the field, destroyed its works, and pursued it as far as B logue.

The third column under Pignatilli had entered Florence. General Nugent retired to Pistora. There Pignatelli attacked him, but failed, and was driven under the walls of Florence. Two more attacks were made upon him on the 10th and 11th, but the enemy were each time repulsed with considerable loss in killed and wounded.

A Declaration of War against Murat, has, we understand, been determined upon by our Government, and will be speedily issued.

"In the different actions up to this time 2000 Neapo-

litan prisoners have been brought io.

"The result of all the operations in Italy proves that Murat has been obliged to relinquish the offensive. Beaten at all points he has retreated from the banks of the Po.

The Proclamation of the Lords Justices and Council of Ireland, proclaiming the Baronies of Kilnemanagh and Eliogurty, Co. Tipperary, to be in a state of disturbance and requiring an extraordinary establishment of Police arrived too late for this day's publication.

The assessed taxes and the duty upon malt in this country are to be assimilated to those of England. This alteration will introduce some new taxes, and considerably augment others.

Bonaparte, proves to be erroneous

In the House of Commons on Tuesday se'nnight General Gascoyne gave notice, that he should on the following day move that it be an instruction to the committee on the property tax bill, to introduce a clause for the exemption from this tax, of the officers, whether naval or military, when engaged in actual or foreign service.

Proceedings have been instituted in the Court of King's Bench, England, and Doctors' Commons, against the gallant Colonel and the Lady, whose criminality was lately discovered in the vicinity of Hanover Square, London.

Saturday last, a criminal information was filed ex officio, by the Attorney General against the Proprietor of the Free. man's Journal. for publishing the speech of Counsellor O'Connell, lately delivered in Cork.

In the Court of Exchequer on Saturday, the verdict obtained by Miss M'Carthy a. Captain Grace, of the Queen's eounty militia at the last assizes for the county Kerry, for breach of promise of mariage, has been setaside.

The Right Hon. and Right Rev the Lord Bishop of Killaloe, arrived at the See House, Killaloe, on Saturday from Dublin.

The Right Rev. Lord Bishop of Limerick has presented a silver cup and salver to the parish church of Knockhane, in the diocese of Ardfert.

Andrew Finucane, Esq has writen to his agent, Mr. O'Grady, to make a reduction of one fifth of their rents to his tenants in the Co Clare,
