A PROCLAMATION.

W. ARMAGH, MANNERS, C. G. HEWETT,

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Fifty-fourth year of his present Majesty, entitled, "An Act for the better execution of the Laws in Ireland, by appointing Superintending Magistrates, and additional constables in counties, in certain cases;" it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be law- ful for the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, for the time being, by the advice of the Privy Council of Ireland, to declare by Proclamation that any county, county of a city, or county of a town in Ireland, or any barony or baro- nies or half barony or half baronies, in any county at large, to be therein specified, is or are in a state of disturbance, and requires or require an extraordinary establishment of police;

AND whereas it has sufficiently appeared to us, that the baronies of Kilmacnagh and Elogurty, in the Co. of Tipperary, are in a state of disturbance, and require an extraordinary establishment of police.

NOW We the Lords Justices, by and with the advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, by virtue of the said act, and the powers thereby vested in us, do by this our Proclamation declare, that the said baronies of Kilmacnagh and Elogurty, in the county of Tipperary, in this part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, are in a state of disturbance, and require an extraordinary establishment of police.
