CATHOLIC HIERARCHY'S RECENT STATEMENT.

In all the Catholic Churches of the City on Sunday the statement issued by the Irish Catholic Hierarchy after their meeting at Maynooth, on the 26th April, was read at the various Masses. The statement expressed the opinion that the wisest course for Ireland was to accept the Treaty, and concluded with an appeal to the leaders, civil and military, to come together and devise a way of peace.

THE LATE MR SEAN WALL.

Yesterday was the first anniversary of the death of Mr Sean Wall, Chairman of the Limerick Co. Council, who was shot dead in action by Crown forces near Oola. He was buried in the Republican circle, Mount St Lawrence Cemetery, and yesterday Regular troops under General Commandant Hannigan, Brigade Commandant Murphy, O.C. Limerick City, and Brigade Commandant O'Connell, Mid-Limerick Brigade, with a firing party visited the cemetery and fired a volley over the grave. Relatives of the deceased were also present, and prayers were recited by the Rev Fr R McCarthy, C.C.
