On the 8th of May, in Ely-place, Dublin, at a very advanced age, **Thomas Casey, Esq. Barrister-at-Law.** Mr. Casey was a remarkable man, in remarkable times, and presented in every sense and acceptance of the term, a singularly favourable specimen of the Irish gentleman of the old school. Bland and social in habit—warm and frank in manner—cordial and sincere in feeling—courteous and polished in demeanour, he was at once respected and beloved. With a memory richly stored, and a mind highly cultivated, he was the attraction and the ornament of every circle in which he moved. His wit was playful—occasionally pungent, but never offensive—in repartee he was quick, but by no means caustic—his epigrams were pointed without being personal; and his anecdotes (which he related as no one else could) were terse, and always happily illustrative of his subject. To his family and friends he will be an irreparable loss, and his decease will leave a blank in society not easily filled. In all the relative positions throughout a long and varied life, Mr. Casey sustained his character for honour, independence, high-mindedness and fidelity; and was pre-eminently distinguished for kindness of heart, gentleness of deportment, and amiability of disposition.
