At a meeting of the following Magistrates in the neighbour- hood of Six Mile Bridge, held on the 12th inst. to take into consideration the circumstances attending the burning of Mr. Jones's Mill and Dwelling House, Sir Edward O'Brien, Bart. in the Chair—Thomas Studdert, Boyle Vandeleur, Henry Butler, Richard Creagh, Thomas Seale, Michael Dalton, T. Studdert, Jun. Esqrs

The following resolutions were unanimously agreed to, after having examined on oath William Jones, Proprietor, Thos. Wall, Miller, Laurence Tierney, Clerk, and John Blake, Labourers:

That the fire did not originate from negligence, the machinery having ceased work several hours neither fire or candle light being used in the Mill or Stores for several days previous to the evening of the 4th inst. and strict examination being made said evening of the entire concern, on account of its great wetness.

That we bear ample testimony to the uniform good conduct of Mr. Jones his skill, industry, punctuality and integrity.

Kilkenny, May 3.—On Sunday night last, between the hours of twelve and one o'clock, a party of men attacked the house of Cascade, near Freshford, the residence of Richard Lalor, Esq.— They attempted to break open the windows of the parlour and drawing-room and Mr. Lalor's private office, all at the same time, but they only succeeded in breaking the parlour and drawing-room windows, which they immediately entered. Mr. Lalor was not at home—but his sons, upon hearing the noise, instantly got up and fired at some of the men who had not already entered the house, and fortunately wounded one of them, it is supposed mortally, from the quantity of blood found outside the house. Whilst Mr. Wm. Lalor was firing at them, a faithful servant was out backwards to alarm the people of Freshford, and he, through an imprudent zeal, rang the bell of the church, which alarmed the robbers, and caused them to decamp, taking with them their wounded companion; by the time the people of Freshford had arrived the entire gang had fled. The young Mr. Lalors, however, immediately pursued them in several directions, accompanied by the people of Freshford, but were unable to trace them farther than the bridge of Foyle, to which place they tracked the blood of the wounded man. Mr. Wm. Lalor saw only five men at the house, one of whom had a new scythe—two more were stationed on the bridge of Freshford, to give the alarm to the fellows at the house in case of an attack. They left a ladder, a sledge, a hammer, and other articles behind them at Mr. Lalor's.— *Leinster Journal.*

A Monster.—Miss Caroline Crane, a young lady, resident in the neighbourhood of Soho-square, London, was attacked by a Monster in human shape, in Greek-street, in her way home, about nine o'clock, on Monday se'night, who stabbed her with some sharp instrument above the knee, and laid open her thigh as far as the hip; he did not speak to her on passing, but inflicted the wound and ran off. Surgeon Bell, of Dean-street, being sent for, came, dressed the wound, and it was his opinion it would have been mortal, but that the length of the stays prevented the instrument from entering the abdomen. She is out of danger.
