at CROOM, on MONDAY,  
1841, for the purpose of preventing  
on the RIVER MAIGUE.  
JAMES DENIS LYONS, Esq. D. L.  
1st. Resolved—That this meet-  
ing regret the great decrease of Fish in the  
and is of opinion that it is occasioned  
by illegal fishing.  
2d. Resolved—That we do approve  
the purpose of protecting the River  
and of prosecuting all offenders, at  
terminated by the Committee.  
3d. Resolved—That the object of  
is not to interfere with the fair fish-  
ing but to prevent Poaching on the River, to the  
destruction of the fish.
