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and rank, who had stabbed him and afterwards herself; but that upon a minute enquiry into the truth, no such outrages had ever been committed.

Were there any towns or villages destroyed during the time you served under Col. Cham- pion in Rohilland?

A. When the army first arrived, several vil- lages were deserted, and some outrages might have been committed; but the witness did not know of any town or village which was de- stroyed.

He proceeded to state that at the first alarm the husbandmen and manufacturers flew on all sides from their dwellings; but after the defeat of the Rohillas, and the death of their general the Nabob Vizier issued general orders to pro- tect the natives, and accordingly they returned to their habitations.

That by the treaty of peace which followed that war, it was stipulated, that the Rohillas should depart the country, and cross the Gan- ges, which was accordingly done by about forty thousand of them, including women and children—That they were not molested in their retreat—And that the country of Rohilland, when he marched back, was in as good a state of cultivation, as when they entered it—These are the striking features of Major Balfour's evidence, and we left him under a close ex- amination, at ten o'clock.
