MR. TUTHILL,

HAS the satisfaction to announce to his fellow Citizens, that the Motion on Thursday last, in the King's Bench, on the Writ of *Quo Warranto* concerning non-resident Freeman, in which He was Plaintiff, and EDWARD O'GRADY, Esq. Defendant, was merely disposed of in favour of the Defendant, he (the Defendant) having sent in an affidavit of four lines, that he was never sworn a Freeman, nor had he exercised the Franchise of a Freeman in any way.

The Defendant did not attempt to deny the charges brought by Plaintiff against non residents, but these charges could not be pursued against the Defendant, he having sworn as above. Such is the boasted triumph!

But Mr. TUTHILL assure his Fellow Citizens, that this retreat of Mr. O'GRADY from a *Nisi Prius* issue does not, in the most distant manner, affect the merits or retard the progress of the general *Quo Warranto* proceedings, in which there is no doubt of success.

So secret are the proceedings at the Tholsel of Limerick, that Mr. TUTHILL, notwithstanding every exertion on his part, could not out of 170 Freeman, admitted and elected within the last three years, fix upon any one who had exercised the right—nor probably, will these 170 Freeman be sworn until their votes become necessary to dispose of the representation of the City.

Note—All these occasional Freeman are subject by the 55th of the King, to pay a Stamp duty of 2s British, to be paid previous to admission, or one month after. Of the above 170, of which Mr. O'GRADY is one, 106 have been already admitted, and of course, have paid the Stamp duty. Query—Are not those elected liable to the same duty?
