The Hon. Colonel Westera, D.L., presided at the annual meeting of the King's County Protestant Orphan Society, on Wednesday; there are only 38 children on the books, and no claimants for admission. The Rev. Augustus Coghlan, Rector of Nantewan, was one of the speakers.

The Patagonian Missionary Society held a meeting on Monday in Cork, the Rev. Wm. Gabbett in the chair. The Rev. W Gray, the deputation secretary, gave an interesting account of the state of the mission in Patagonia, which he illustrated by maps and diagrams. A collection was made in aid of the funds of the mission.

The Wexford Auxiliary Society for promoting Christianity among the Jews held a meeting in Wexford on Monday, the Rev. Mr. Elgee in the chair, when the deputation (Rev. Mr. Ferrar) explained the principles and operations of the Society to a crowded audience, after which a collection was made.

The disturbances in the church of St. George's in the East are now likely to terminate. The Bishop of London has issued a monition, forbidding the choristers from occupying seats within the communion rails and also prohibiting other practices in the church. This monition was enforced on Sunday by the churchwardens, and the services passed off in a comparatively orderly manner.

Six made their vows—Sister Stanislaus O'Brien, and Sister Agatha Febrnbacher, from Villingen, Grand Duchy of Baden. The four others Bridget O'Leary, Anna Mahony, Mary Sheehan, and Teresa O'Doherty, all lay sisters.

Madame de Baligand, foundress and superioress of the Convent of the Good Shepherd, Clare Street, has left for Aix la Chapelle, in Rhenish Prussia at the call of her religious superioress.

The Treasurer of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul acknowledges the receipt of 5l, from the Right Worshipful the Mayor.

The Sisters of the Good Shepherd acknowledge the receipt of 5l, from Alderman Wm. Fitzgerald, Mayor of Limerick, towards the funds of the Magdalen Asylum.

It is intended to celebrate the approaching anniversary of the accession of Pope Pius the 9th, throughout the Roman Catholic church. His election took place on the 16th June, 1846, and the coronation on the 21st of same month.

The sum of 1,850 has been forwarded to Rome from the diocese of Southwark, and 2,300l. from the diocese of Salford. In addition to these amounts about 900l. is acknowledged from a few individuals, including 400l. from the Count Torre Diaz and family and 100l. each from Lord Petre, Lord Herries, Sir John Acton, and Mr Fullerton. DEATHS.

We have to record the death of the Rev. William Bourke, P.P. of Rockhill and Bruce, in this county, which melancholy event took place yesterday morning, at his town residence, John's-square, after a severe illness, borne with perfect resignation to the will of his Divine Master. The deceased reverend gentleman was highly esteemed and respected by all classes of his fellow-citizens. Previous to his appointment to the parishes named, he had been for several years Administrator of the parish of St. John's, where his loss will be acutely felt by the working and poorer classes, to whose wants he at all times ministered with true Christian zeal and piety. It may be truly said that next to Right Rev. Dr. Ryan, R.C.B., he was the founder of the magnificent new Roman Catholic Cathedral of St. John's, which will long stand as a monument of his piety, for he was untiring and indefatigable in his exertions to forward that gigantic undertaking, which is now hastening to completion. He was ever prompt to the call of duty; possessed of unconquerable energy of character, united with benevolence and zeal, he was capable of the most successful action in every laudable enterprise, and took share in every useful local movement, irrespective of party or of creed. This morning there was solemn Office and High Mass at St. John's Chapel, where the body had been washed, the Right Rev. Dr Ryan presiding, surrounded by all the local clergy, after which the funeral obsequies took place, in which the congregated trades united, with banners muffled, and the citizens generally assembled to pay the last sad tribute of respect to departed worth. The remains of the much lamented clergyman were interred in the Lady Chapel of the new Cathedral.
