 bales. Demand for Irish singed was steady last
 week until the close when 80s f. o. b. being required
 for favorite Waterford sizeable, and charged for
 orders, enquiries were checked, and the market ended
 dull at our quotations. No transactions in Irish bale
 middles. Arrivals from America into Liverpool were
 3,319 boxes against 263 in the corresponding week
 last year. Singed sides are offered at 64s to 66s,
 short rib-in middles at 62s to 64s, Cumberland cut
 60s to 62s. Long cut Hams in salt at 68s to 70s with
 little doing.

Butter—Imports of Irish 372 firkins. Arrived
