FOYNES MAN'S DEATH AT CLONMEL

The news of the death at Clonmel, where he had resided for the past number of years, of Mr. Michael Shanahan, a member of a well-known Foynes family, has been received with regret in the district. The late Mr. Shanahan, up to the time of his retirement some years ago, had had a long service on the G.S. Railways Co. as guard on the Foynes-Ballingrane branch line. He was a familiar figure at Foynes station during the early years of the present century, and was very popular as a result of his unfailing courtesy with the hosts of travellers from West Limerick and North Kerry who connected with the Foynes train. He was a brother of Mr. James Shanahan, Foynes, and of Mrs. M. O'Connor, Clonmel.

DROMCOLLOGHER'S LIGHTING PROBLEM

Due to the recent restrictions, which of necessity had to be imposed by the E.S.B., the townspeople have been set a problem to keep their usage of current below the allocated ration (writes our Dromcollogher correspondent).
