

JUBILEE YEAR.

Procession in Limerick.

At the Holy Year Jubilee procession of the members of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family took place in Limerick on Sunday, and was a striking religious demonstration. Over 10,000 men and boys participated in the procession, which was marshalled by the indefatigable Spiritual Director, Rev. James Cleary, C.S.S.R., in the bands attached to the Redemptorist Church. Punctual to time, 2 o'clock, the demonstration was under way, and as it moved along the streets it presented an imposing and inspiring spectacle. The bannerettes, and statues carried a colour to the scene, while the music of the five bands that took part in the procession blended harmoniously with the singing, and filled the atmosphere with a sweet sound. Fine summer weather attended the event, and the four churches prescribed in the Episcopal regulations were visited—St John's Cathedral, St. Joseph's, and the Redemptorist, one of which was, however, capable of accommodating anything like a majority of the processions, so that the necessary prayers had to be recited in the open as well as in the churches.

The Cross-bearer and acolytes led the procession, and next in order of precedence the Boherbuoy Brass and Reed Band, which immediately preceded the Boys' Band, the members of which, like the girls, wore ribbons and medals. Then marched the bands of St. John's and St. Michael's, who sang the prescribed hymns to the accompaniment of the Workingmen's Band, St. Mary's Fife and Drum Band, and the section of Boherbuoy Brass and Reed Band, and Sarsfield Fife and Drum Band. The huge procession, which marched in the front by the front grouped statue of the Holy Family drawn in a carriage by four horses. The route taken was through the main Street, Lord Edward Street, Upper Gerald Griffin Street, Cathedral Street, and Cathedral Place, to St. John's Cathedral, Thence via John Street, the Sandhills, to St. Mary's and finally, by Patrick Street and St. Joseph's, to St. Joseph's and the

SHOCKING CYCLING FATALITY.

Young Girl Killed.

A shocking accident, attended with fatal result, occurred on the road between Limerick and Clonlara last evening, and in which Miss Bridget (Brenda) Walshe lost her life. The deceased, who was nineteen years of age, and a native of Ballyhahill, Foynes, was employed in the office of Messrs Siemens-Schuckert, Shannon scheme contractors, at Clonlara, as typist. Sometime after six o'clock she was cycling to Parteen, where she stayed with her aunt, Mrs. Kearney, and approaching a place called Connor's Cross, three miles from Limerick, she collided with Siemens-Schuckert's charabanc travelling in an opposite direction, and was killed almost instantaneously. It is stated that one of the wheels of the vehicle passed over the head, inflicting frightful injuries. She was only three weeks in the employment of the Shannon scheme contractors.

An inquest is being held this evening.

Driver Arrested

He was, on the application of the Civic Guards, remanded on bail of £500 and two sureties of £250 each to the next Liberties District Sessions.
