RAILWAY CLERKS' ASSOCIATION.

Limerick Branch.

At a meeting of the Limerick Branch, held last night, satisfaction was expressed at the result of negotiations with the G.S.R. in connection with the question of free travelling facilities. Great indignation was expressed at the action of the Railway Clearing System Superannuation Fund Corporation in increasing the rate of contribution to the fund against the wishes of its members, and agreed with the attitude taken up by the Association's General Secretary. It was decided to postpone the discussion on the Proposed Advisory Committee for Irish Affairs until the meeting to be held on the 8th June at the Glentworth Hotel at 8 p.m. As this is a very important matter it is to be hoped there will be a very large attendance of members. Delegates to the Irish Council are specially requested to be present.

The following vote of condolence was passed:—"That the members of the Limerick Branch of the Railway Clerks' Association respectfully tender their deepest sympathy to the Misses O'Neill on the death of their mother and sister, and to the relatives of the late Mr Daniel McMahon, who passed away at Ennis on the 23rd of April, 1928."

DEATH OF MR W. W. RUTTLE.

The death is announced in London of Mr W. Wilson Ruttle, a well-known and very capable journalist, and a native of County Limerick. He began his professional career on the Dublin Press, and subsequently joined the London Daily Express. He had been in poor health for some years, and passed away at the age of 50. He was an accomplished musician, and very popular with his colleagues and friends.

COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTIONS.

CHILD FATALLY BURNED.

Last evening Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, held an inquest on the body of Michael Purcell, aged two and a half years, who succumbed to burns received on Thursday, by falling into a pot of boiling water, in the house of his parents at Little Barrington street.

The mother, Delia Purcell stated that she was only after taking a pot of boiling water off the fire, and left it for a moment on the kitchen floor. Almost immediately the child ran into the house, and stumbling, fell into it. Witness promptly took him out, and then went for assistance.

Dr. P. F. Graham, stated that death was due to convulsions as a result of the accident, and a verdict accordingly was returned.
