

Marquis Carmarthen, 10th Hussars, is in the suite of the Duke of Northumberland, British Ambassador to the coronation of the King of France.
M. Milinon, the celebrated but ever unfortunate engraver, committed suicide at Paris a few days ago, by throwing himself into the Seine, in a state of intoxication. His propensity to spirituous liquors was incurable.
Thomas Roberts, the eminent stock broker, who yesterday morning, is supposed to have left upwards of 100,000*l.*

M. Sibree, surgeon and accouchier, committed suicide yesterday morning, by cutting his throat in a frightful manner.

An inquest was held yesterday on the body of Mr. James Bill, an Officer in the India Company's service, who had committed suicide by blowing his brains out. He was recently promoted; but having received a kick from a horse at Ascot Races, it was deemed necessary to amputate the leg, which it is supposed preyed so heavily on his mind, destroying all his expectations, that he was led to the fatal deed in consequence.

On Tuesday, the Coach from Bath to Oxford was overturned, when one Gentleman was killed, another, Captain Wootton-Bassett, had his thigh dreadfully lacerated, and the recovery of Mr. Phipp, of Highworth, is impaired of.

The Rev. William Hayes was brought up yesterday for judgment in the King's Bench, for a misdemeanour of a singular nature, and after a suitable admonition from the Judge, sentenced to six months' imprisonment.

In Glasgow, a few days ago, John McDonald, an operative, was tried for combination, riot, and sedition, and sentenced on conviction to seven years transportation.

Four brothers of the name of Culhane, and a man named Patrick Bridgeman, became tenants in March last to a quantity of land near Robertstown, the property of Lord Clonbrock. They were employed ploughing it on Tuesday evening, when nine men approached them from a distance, and called out to the labourers to quit the ground, a mandate which was instantly obeyed.— They then presented a gun and pistol, with other weapons, and asked the Culhanes how dare they take the land, striking one of the brothers a desperate blow on the head, which felled him to the earth insensible, and shortly terminated his mortal sufferings. The others, on this, in vain called out for mercy, and after a feeble resistance to the repeated blows of their cruel assailants, were all stretched on the ground covered with wounds, and faint from loss of blood. The ruffians having thus fully gratified their sanguinary intentions on their innocent victims, moved off in triumph towards Ahanish. An inquest has been since held by the Rev. George Vincent and William R. Yielding, Esq. on the body of the murdered man, Michael Culhane, and a verdict of wilful murder returned against persons unknown. The other unfortunate men were conveyed into Rathkeale, where they continue under surgical care in a most dangerous state. The life of one is given over, the recovery of another is uncertain, but a third will survive. The scene is represented as a most dreadful one.

The house of a man named Creagh, near Cappamore, was attacked on Wednesday night by three fellows, two of whom were armed with guns. They forced an entrance, and robbed him and his wife of from 50*l.* to 60*l.* which lay in a canister, presenting their pieces at the same time, and threatening them with the fate of the Connells at Bilbao. They departed without further molestation.

On the night of Tuesday last, an armed party forcibly entered the house of a poor man named David Nealon, of Graig, near Pallas-Kerry, whom they beat, as also his wife, in a most cruel manner; and after endeavouring to swear Nealon not to go to Ballinaholee, to act as herdsman to Mr. James Hill, postmaster of Pallas-Kerry, they departed. Next morning, Nealon and wife were removed to Pallas-Kerry, where the most humane attention was paid them by Surgeon Enright.

The following is the copy of a notice posted at Ballinaholee, near Pallas-Kerry, in this County, on Thursday night:—

“Take Notice—I do hereby Caution any person sending a Man or Horse to work on the lands of Ballinaholee to James Hill that I will cut off their Ears from the Roof of their Skulls, and I further Caution the said James Hill not to go to any further trouble on these lands as he shall never enjoy the Benefit of them, if he was Guarded by all the Peelers and Soldiers in the County of Limerick.”
