

The affairs of Pierlot and Co. are expected to turn out very ill. They had speculated very largely upon the success of the invasion of the Peninsula. This failure it was supposed would be deeply felt at Bayonne. Most of the houses at that port were either branches of, or much connected with, the Pierlot and Co.

A vessel arrived yesterday which left Cadiz two days after the last packet. No farther accounts had been received of the progress of the expedition under the command of General Blake. The Cortes have decreed the sale of the Royal domains, with the exception for the present of the palaces and seats making part thereof, in the provinces which are not occupied by the enemy. Little can be expected from this as a war resource. In the present state of Spain but few purchasers will be found for property so circumstanced.—Soult has republished his ferocious proclamation, in which he threatens to treat such Spaniards in arms as may fall into his hands as a banditti.
