A BOTANICAL RAMBLE LAST JUNE AT GORTBWEEHEEN LAKE.

In the Parish of Oughtmama, I arrived at the lake on a bright June day about one o'clock, to hunt for all the rare plants in and about the lake as follows:—

The first that attracted my observation was Arundo Phragmites and Scirpus lacustris growing side by side abundantly, and close by were strong tufts of Carex Hudsonii, forming compact hassocks. Also in the mud beneath those were Carex paludosa and ampullacea growing profusely in the mud, and close by were large patches of Carex vulgaris and remota. And a few yards away from those I observed Menyanthes trifoliata, Polygonum amphibium and Caltha palustris growing in the spongy pools and mud in profusion. Also in the fissures of the rocks on the margin of the lake I noticed Lysimachia punctata, Thalictrum flavum, Rhamnus catharticus, Cornus sanguinea, Rubus cæsius, and Lastrea Thelypteris. And close by, on the grassy sward, were Viola stagnina and Canina. I also noticed the following Orchises a few hundred yards away from the lake: Gymnadenia Conopsea, Orchis maculata var alba, Listera ovata, Habenaria bifolia abundant, and also a few withered spikes of the rare Neotinia intacta, and close by, in the limestone fissures, were Mercurialis perennis galore.

This concludes my finds for the day in and about this interesting limestone lake, which is only about six acres in extent, which I consider well worth revisiting on some fine future day next summer.
