Abstract of an Act to prevent tumultuous Rifings of Persons within this Kingdom,

From the 1st of May, 1766, if any Persons, to the Number of five, or more, shall by Night, affault, injure, or maltreat any perfon or persons, by wounding, beating, tying, or other act of cruelty, whereby the life or limb of the person assaulted may be in danger; or shall wilfully destroy or injure his, her, or their property, by killing, maining, or worrying their Cattle, or by dellroying or fpoiling their houses, barns, mills, or mill-dams, hay, corn, potatoes, whether in the field or haggard, or maliciously digging up ground. All and every person or persons so offending, and being thereof found guilty, shall suffer death, as in cases of Felony, without benefit of Clergy

If any persons in number as above, shall commit any of the above offences in the day time, he and they shall on conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony, and the court thall have power to transport such Felons.

Upon notice given to the high constable of the Barony where the offences shall be committed, as in the case of robbery petitions, if the inhabitants of the adjoining towns, &c. shall not apprehend the Offenders, or some or one of them, or shall not discover, and give an examination to a justice of Peace against one or more of them, the perfor or perfons injured thall be intitled to fatisfaction for the lofs, to be prefented and raifed on the County at large, or upon any Barony of the County, at the diferetion of the Grand Jury.

Any person or persons who shall break open any Prison with an intention to enlarge any prisoner, or prisoners, and shall be found guilty thereof, shall fuffer death, as in cases of Felony, without benefit of Clergy, and may be tried before the trial or attainder of the person or persons so enlarged.

Every person who shall rescue any person committed by a justice of Peace on a mittimus, for Treason or Felony, from a constable, &c. before the person committed thall be lodged

violence, or menaces, impose or tender any Oath or folemn Engagement on any person or persons, to compel or engage him, her, or them to commit or conceal any unlawful act, shall, on conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony, without benefit of clergy.

Every Justice of the Peace shall have power to fummon and examine any person or persons, within his jurisdiction, whom he shall suspect to have taken fuch illegal Oaths, and upon refafal to be examined, to commit fuch person or perfons to the county jail, for any time not exceeding fix months.
