That fhould certainly be repealed for he did not fee, by any effect in the prefent bill, but the Privy Council might recall this power, under a corrupt Ministry and it was not to be supposed that the breed of the Strafford s in political principles, were yet extinct, and an achitrary Government might at fome future period take advantage of the negligence of the pretent hour.
