MR. SEXTON'S RESIGNATION.

The following letter was received late last night
y Mr. Justin McCarthy, M.P., relative to Mr.
exton's resignation:—

“13th June, 1893.

“GENTLEMEN—I have received your letter,
nclosing a copy of the resolution adopted
esterday by the Irish Party, and I have also read
e published abstarct of the proceedings at the
eeting. My own opinion as to the expediency
my resignation, and my own strong desire to
arry it into effect, remain unaltered. I cannot,
owever, disregard the generous feeling which
ctated the resolution of yesterday, nor can I
t aside the view of the Party at large upon the
ersonal question, as testified both by the
esolution actually adopted and by the original
otion.

“I accordingly waive for the present my own
pinion, and yield my own desire. On the
ublication of this letter I shall resume my
ttendance at the House of Commons for the
urpose of continuing, and as I hope, completing
e discharge of duties connected with the
overnment of Ireland Bill.
