mas, M.P. and Mr. Watson are at Kinsale, DEATH OF CAPTAIN BARLOW, 20TH REGT. Captain Frederick C. Barlow, 20th, son of the late Lieut .- General John J. Barlow, died on Saturday night,

after a short illness, at his lodgings, in George-street, having come in from detachment at Nenagh, a few days previously, for the benefit of medical advice. He had been suffering from influenza and cold, to which he incautiously exposed himself, and then most probably neglected, but he had the best professional attendance in this garrison, consisting of Surgeon Twhaites, Dr. Fraser, Staff Assistant-Surgeon Pitcairn, and the medical officer of his Regt. but we regret to state human skill was unavailing, and he died in the arms of his young and interesting wife, who is left, with an only child, an infant, to deplore the early and premature loss of an affectionate hasband and parent. Captain Barlow was the senior officer of his rank, and had served several years with the 20th in India. He acted as Brigade Major in the Chester district, when Capt. Considine, 69th, succeeded him. * His promotion to the rank of Major in the

was noted for the Gazette, but Providence has altered the disposition, which will now go without purchase in the Regiment, the officers and men of which deeply regret his unexpected death. His fatherin-law, the Rev. Robt. Taylor, Rector of Clifton Campville, Staffordshire, arrived this day from England, to console his widowed daughter under her affliction, and to attend the remains of his son-in-law to the sister country for interment. Capt. Barlow was brother-inlaw to Col. Thomas. M.P. who commands the 20th, and of Colonel Le Marchant, 99th, who on learning the sad fatality, arrived here on Monday morning from Dublin. These three officers were married to the daughters and co-heiresses of the Rev. Dr. Taylor. Since the demise of Captain Barlow the troops in garrison have paraded and mounted guard without music, and every respect due to the solemnity of the occasion has been rendered. At twelve o'clock to-morrow the funeral cavalcade will proceed from George's-street with full military honours, attended by Major-General Sir Wm. Machean,

On the departure of Sir Edward Barnes from India, Capt. Barlow held the appointment of Brigade-Major to the Royal Troops at Calcutta, and, as we stated, more recently held a similar situation in the Northern district in England. Lieut.
