Mr. Gabbett contended Mr. Spillane's motion

and others were paying a lot of money to get an
investigation into the sanitary accounts there
was not as much as a four-penny bit found to have
gone wrong, while if Mr. Spillane and those
gentlemen with him looked at the Markets
Trustees' accounts they would find £1,700 of
their money was taken from them. That
showed where the incompetency wa-, and Mr.
Spillane's action had now thrown them into a mess.
The auditor stated there was not a shilling due
to Mr. Hennessy, and he had surcharged four
guardians who had signed cheques to pay Mr.
Hennessy £100. If they settled the matter
by arbitration those guardians will lose that
money, and he thought Mr. Spillane was riding
on a donkey altogether as regards this business.

Mr. Hosford suggested that the £100 should
be included in the scope of the arbitration.

Mr. M'Inerney did not think Mr. Nunan
would agree to this course. He suggested three
members from each board be appointed to con-
sider the case.

On the motion of Mr. M'Namara, it was de-
cided to leave the matter to a joint committee of
members of the Board of Guardians and of the
Rural Sanitary Board to decide whether it be re-
ferred to arbitration or law.

The Board adjourned.

THE THUNDERSTORM—SAD DEATH OF A LIMERICK MAN.

A violent thunderstorm burst over Cork
harbour and district on Monday, accompanied
by heavy rain and vivid flashes of forked
lightning. It was felt with much severity on
Spike Island, where a number of men belonging
to the Royal Artillery were undergoing drill in
the square. The battery was at once ordered into
barracks, but one of the men—Gunner
M'Donough, a young man belonging to Limerick
returned to the square to pick up a steel pocket-
knife he had dropped, and when in the act of
doing so the unfortunate man was struck by the
lightning on the right side of the head and killed
instantaneously. The current of electricity
travelled down his right side and cut away his
boot, and severed two of his toes from his foot.
His body and face became dreadfully disfigured,
and turned quite black whilst all his clothes were
burned, and portions of his flesh charred and
scorched. The remains of the poor fellow were
removed into one of the Queenstown Military
hospitals. Deceased was well known in the city.
He was a resident of Clare-street, and was for
many years a prominent member of the St.
Patrick's Gaelic Club, by the members of which
he was greatly liked.
