The court said, and he swore that on Sunday last, May, he had a row with the prisoner, that he was stabbed by him with a knife, and that he saw the knife in the prisoner's hand, but he did not see the stab given, corroborated by the evidence. A witness, who was in company with the prisoner on the evening in question, deposed that the prisoner was drunk and kicked up the prisoner, who then was pursued by the prosecutor and his witnesses, and that he saw the stabbing as he was not near the prisoner himself knocked down. He said that when he first saw the prosecutor, he was running under a very sharp and nasty rain, which placed his life in danger; it was a blow on the shoulder, and was not a dangerous one, but was one from the effects of which he will, with all probability, recover. LIMERICK COUNTY PETTY SESSIONS.—The magistrates who presided at these sessions on Thursday were—J. T. Devitt, (Chairman); John W. Mahony, M. R. Ryan, P. G. Barron, R. M., J. C. Delmege, and D. M. Maunsell, Esqrs.—John Silk and Pat Fallon, two juveniles, who were charged with running away from the Gort Union Workhouse, and stealing clothes the property of the guardians, were remanded for a week until communication was made to the Gort Guardians. Bridget M'Mahon and Sarah Rose were sent to gaol for 14 days for disobedience of the workhouse rules, and fighting in that establishment. These juveniles fought a dreadful combat about the Pope and Garibaldi. They are both Roman Catholics, yet they held different political opinions. The battle was a drawn one. It terminated on the Imperial interference of the master. The constabulary prosecuted several persons for various breaches of the road act, and for drunkenness; the defendants were each fined in light penalties with costs.

At a meeting of the Scariff board of Guardians on Thursday, Dennis Slattery, Esq., in the Chair, Mr. G. W. Bassett, of Newport Mills was declared Contractor for the supply of bread stuffs; and Mr M'Donnell, for ash timber for fuel.

The body of John Mannix, the second of the two young men who was drowned on Sunday week at Plassy, was found on Wednesday morning last. An inquest was held on the remains by the Coroner, Thomas Costello Esq., on Thursday, when a verdict was returned, by the Jury, of 'death by accidental drowning.'

On Sunday last a young man named Cunningham went to fish in Knockaloch, between Ennis and Kiltrush, was drowned by the upsetting of a boat in which the unfortunate angler was seated. The brother of Cunningham, who was on the bank, on witnessing the accident, rushed to the rescue, but was also unfortunately drowned.
