CITY MALICIOUS INJURY CLAIM.

Corporation Not Property Insurers.

An application was made at the Circuit court yesterday, before Judge McElligott, J.C., by the Saxone Shoe Company, for compensation under the Malicious Injury acts for £12 and £14 for damage to opals used for ornamentation purposes in front of their establishment in O'Connell-street and William-street on the 23rd January and 25th February.

Mr J. Dodds, solicitor, appeared for the applicants, and Mr G. Kenny (instructed by Mr J. J. Dundon, solr), for the Limerick Borough Council.

Evidence having been given to the effect that the ornaments were broken maliciously, counsel contended that if the Court were to award damages in this case, it would mean that the Borough Council would in reality be insurers for the property of the citizens. It was held, in addition, that accident was not negatived.

His Lordship concurred in the view of counsel, and dismissed both applications with costs.
