SIR.—Having remarked a paragraph in several papers, but which seems to have originally appeared in a Limerick journal purporting that George Evans Crowe, Esq., of Rosebank, county Galway, was about to lay claim to the title of Carbery, as being a nearer heir to the late Lord than the actual possessor of that Peerage, I beg to state that the present Lord Carbery is the eldest son of the only brother, who left issue of John, late and 6th Lord, and consequently is next and rightful heir, and that his Lordship has no brothers, the Hon. Major Fenton Evans Freke, of Life Guards, and Hon. William Evans Freke, the former of whom is the heir presumptive to the Peerage, but even should the present Lord and his brothers be of issue male, the Peerage would then devolve on representatives either of the late Rt. Hon. George Evans, of Portman, co. Dublin, or Eyre Evans, Esq., of All Hallows Towers, in this county. Consequently Mr. Evans could have at best, but a very remote claim to the Peerage, if the title was *descendable* in the female line. His ancestor, Dean Crowe, of Clonfert, through whom it is announced he founds his right having been connected with the family by marriage, but the marriage granted immediately after George the first ascended to the throne is strictly limited to the male line.
