LOSS OF THE ASTREA, EMIGRANT SHIP, FROM THIS PORT TO AMERICA, WITH CREW AND PASSENGERS.

With feelings of profound concern we have to announce this dreadful casualty, which we have ascertained took place on the 5th of May last, at Levan-head, five miles east of Louisburgh, Cape Breton, when, of 224 human beings at the lowest calculation on board the above vessel, only three, the surgeon, carpenter, and one of the crew, were saved, to announce the truly appalling catastrophe which they hap- pened to survive. The Astrea was a ship of between 600 and 700 tons burden, belonging to London, and sailed from this port on the 15th of April last for Quebec, with a full complement of passengers, in company also with the Albion, Priscilla, and Thetis, emigrant vessels, fully freighted with families for the same transatlantic destination. Mrs. Lowe, one of the sufferers included in this terrific loss of human life, was sister of Mr. Seward of George-street, and perished with a young family, who embarked with their mother to join a husband and parent in Canada. The Surgeon who sailed in charge of the passengers is Mr. Jeremiah O'Sullivan, son of the late Dr. O'Sullivan of Rathkeale, and who fortunately escaped the dreadful gulph which swallowed up a whole community of both sexes in childhood, youth, and maturity, with all their worldly treasure.

We annex an authentic return from the Custom-House of this port, of the names of all the passengers, male and female, who embarked in this unfortunate vessel, making a sum total of 211.

One poor country-woman called at our Office yesterday, to assure herself of the fatal news—her son, son-in-law, and daughter, having been among the sufferers. The great majority of those who perished were natives and residents of the County Limerick.

With sincere regret we notice the loss of a vessel, the Astrea, filled with emigrants, bound from Limerick to Quebec. By this melancholy event 250 lives were lost. It is supposed that she got upon the ice off Halifax in a fog. A workbox and a newspaper, containing some accounts from Cork and the neighbourhood were also picked up off Halifax; from which circumstance it is inferred that a vessel bound from Cork to Quebec has also shared the same fate as the vessel from Limerick, as it was known that several casualties had occurred. We obtain these accounts through the Halifax papers, which give but very meagre details of the circumstances attending the melancholy event. Upon inquiry at the Canada houses we could obtain no further information than that which was contained in the Nova Scotia Journals. —London Albion.

THE LORD BISHOP OF LIMERICK.

On Sunday last, this generally esteemed Prelate preached in the Asylum Chapel, recently erected in this City by private subscription of the friends of the Established Church. We have before spoken of the strength and beauty of this building, not less creditable to the devotion and christian spirit of those who carried it on to completion, than to the professional talent of our fellow-citizen, Mr. Fogarty, the Architect.—The Chapel, though being capacious, was crowded to excess, the aisles and even the seat usually appropriated for the Clergyman, were occupied with attentive hearers. His Lordship's text was taken from the 32d chapter 26th verse of Exodus, viz. when Moses addressed the Children of Israel, saying, "Who is on the Lord's side." It is beside our purpose to enter into any lengthened notice much less review of a sermon, but we confess if we were to indulge ourselves we would lay before our readers, if possible, all of the powerful and persuasive arguments urged upon his hearers by this truly christian Bishop. The discourse gave unqualified gratification to all present.

His loss will be severely felt in Ennis and its neighbourhood, where he was unceasing in his exertions for the spread of the Gospel through evil as well as good report. His charity was experienced by many. He never would leave a suppliant in distress, while having the means of relieving him, and did not leave himself two coats. I intend, please God, making a collection about here for his disconsolate widow and child. Perhaps you could do something in Limerick for them, as, from his character, he could not have left them any thing for their support.
