## INSURANCE PROSECUTION AT DROMCOLLOGHER.

At Dromcollogher Petty Sessions on Tuesday, before Messrs P. D. Sullivan, R.M., presiding, H. Sullivan, P. Vaughan, M. Irwin, J. O'Brien, and M. L. Ahern,

Two summonses were heard at the suit of the Irish Insurance Commissioners against Patrick Larkin, of Knocktoish, Dromcollogher, in respect of two employees named Maurice O'Connor and Mary Ellen McCarthy.

Mr. P. J. O'Sullivan, solicitor, Limerick, who appeared to prosecute, said that these cases were about the worst that he had yet to deal with. In the case of the woman the neglect of the defendant in not stamping her card had lost her at least ten pounds of sickness benefit.

Mr. R. F. Mack, Inspector, having given evidence, the magistrates unanimously convicted the defendant. He was fined 5s and costs of Court in each case, and ordered to pay up all arrears, and 10s solicitor's costs in each case.

Mr. Sullivan, R.M., in giving the decision of the Bench, said that were it not that the defendant was a poor man a much larger penalty would have been inflicted. As it was, the girl could sue him (the defendant) for any loss she had sustained by reason of the failure of defendant to stamp her cards.

## PILOTS IN CONFERENCE.

Alderman Michael Joyce, M.P., was, at Glasgow, re-elected President of the United Kingdom Pilot Association, and Hull was chosen as the place of meeting next year. It was decided to communicate with the Merchant Service Guild and other bodies of shipmasters and officers in order to make representations on the subject of shipmasters and officers undertaking their own piloting, especially in non-compulsory ports. In his report, which was approved, Mr. Inskip, solicitor of the Association, favoured a universal system of compulsory pilotage, and also dealt with the position of pilots in connection with salvage.

He was a young man of attractive and engaging manners, and immensely popular with a wide circle of friends. He was an athlete of considerable repute, and a member of the Shannon Football Club. His death has occasioned great regret in the city, and the sympathy of the public will be extended to his father and the other members of the family in their keen sorrow.
