## THE LATE LORD MONTEAGLE'S ESTATE.

The Right Hon. Thomas Aubrey Spring Rice, third Baron Monteagle of Brandon, of Mount Trenchard, Co. Limerick who had served in the Diplomatic Service since 1907, and who succeeded to the peerage in 1926, died on October 11th last, aged fifty years, leaving personal estate in England and the Free State valued at £85,167. Probate of his will, dated 1st May, 1909, has been granted to William Dermot O'Brien, artist, of 65 Fitzwilliam Square, Dublin, the surviving executor. He left £12,500 and certain property at Foynes to the trustees of the settled lands of Mount Trenchard to follow the settlement, and all his property to his sister, the Hon. Mary Elen Spring Rice, who predeceased him.
