### DEATH OF MR CROKER BARRINGTON

We regret to record the death which occurred at Redcliffe, Exmouth, on Wednesday last, of Mr Croker Barrington, in his 75th year. The deceased gentleman, who was second son of the late Sir Croker Barrington, Bart., of Glenstal, Co. Limerick, and brother of Sir Charles Barrington and Mr John B. Barrington, was a Barrister-at-law. He subsequently joined the Solicitors' profession, and was for many years head of the firm of Messrs Barrington and Son, Dublin, and Chief Solicitor of the Great Southern and Western Railway. He retired from the latter position three years ago. Mr Barrington had a residence and estate at Clonkeen, Barrington's Bridge, where he spent some months of the year. He was fond of fishing, and in his student days, with his brothers, took a prominent part in rowing and competed in an important aquatic event in America. He was a very kindly and popular gentleman, and his numerous friends in Limerick and elsewhere deeply sympathise with his family and relatives in their bereavement.
