REPORT upon the PROPOSED MUNICIPAL BOUNDARY of the BOROUGH of TRALEE.

THE ancient Limits extend about seven miles in circumference, and pre-Ancient Limit. vious to the Reform Act no other Limits were known. The points of the Boundary on the West are Ballyvilley, the Black Rock and the centre of the Village of Blennerville, from whence the Boundary on the South proceeds along the River to the Bounds of Ballymullen; and from thence on the East by Ruth's Garden, along to the Gaol, to Clogheirshag Rock; and thence on the North by Clonnalour, Oak Park and Balloughna to Ballyvilley.

Tralee is the County Town of Kerry, and possesses some respectable streets, Description of with good dwelling-houses and shops; a new and handsome County Court House THE TOWN. has been recently erected. The trade and general appearance of the place have been much improved, and the navigable Canal, now in progress, is expected to be of essential benefit to the Town; the Town is increasing.

The Population in 1831 is stated to have been 9,568; it is considered now to Population. be between 10,000 and 11,000.

The only local assessment is for a Foundling Hospital, the annual amount raised Local Rate. is about 90 l.

The County assessment is on lands only; no houses in the Town are assessed County Rate. to this rate.


The Parliamentary Boundary of 1831 embraces all that belongs to the Town, Proposed and allows space for its probable increase, particularly towards the Barracks. Boundary. I therefore recommend that in future the Municipal Boundary should be the same as the Parliamentary Boundary.
