 It was then publicly known that the White Boys were determined on Tuesday night last, to attack Killybarry house. They to the number of upwards of 500, came on the road to Killybarry, in the night of the 22d inst. firing shots, and sounding different horns, they broke open the house of a tenant of Mr. Barry's, at Killybarry, and swore him on oath to declare if he knew that Mr. Barry was prepared for them,—the man confessed he did, and added they would soon know it themselves. They then proceeded towards Mr. Barry's house, but they were most spiritedly attacked on the road by William the younger, his brothers, and a few friends: the White Boys were soon routed, many of them desperately wounded, and one of their Captains, it is since known, had his shoulder and arm shattered to pieces, a horse has been found dead after them, they were pursued by Mr. Barry, but being then on foot, the White Boys got off. If many other Gentlemen would follow so meritorious an example, White Boys would not be so incorrigible or general.  
 On Sunday morning last, public notice was given near the Romish Chapel of Mallow, that the White-Boys of that Parish would appear, by order of Captain Right, early next day at Blarney, soon after which, notice was sent to the several Inhabitants of the town of Mallow, requiring their horses to be ready prepared at whatever hour of the night they should be demanded, and many of them were accordingly called for by the White Boys, and carried off early that night. About the hour of twelve, a number of them, supposed to be about one hundred, attacked the house of the Rev. William King, Rector of said Parish, and alarmed the family, rapping most violently at the hall-door, and announcing themselves White Boys, demanded Mr. King's horses to be instantly produced, or they would fire in at the windows and destroy the place, and one of them had the insolence to force into the house, and even into the bed-chamber where Mr. and Mrs. King lay, but on hearing the horses were ordered for his use, he retired, and they were accordingly given up and carried off. The whole town was in the utmost alarm all night, as successive parties passed through from different parts of the country to Blarney, in the neighbourhood of which we are informed, they assembled next morning to the amount of above 2500 men.  
 Belfast, June 27 On Saturday last, as one Armstrong, a farmer near Holywood, was drying a quantity of powder over the fire in a pot, by some accident it took fire and blew away part of the side wall and rigging of his house, by which his wife and a child were very much hurt, and other damage done.  
 Yesterday and this day, the 58th regiment marched into this town on their way from Scotland (from whence they arrived this week) to Downpatrick and Killough, where we understand they are to be stationed.  
 Waterford, June 27. Last Saturday, John Callaghan, alias Jack-a-boy, who has so frequently broken out of the gaols of Cork and Limerick, was, on Saturday last, thro' the activity of Mr. Wm. Courcy, gaoler, apprehended in Ballybricken, and lodged in the city gaol.  
 At a meeting of the corporation of this city, at the council chamber, yesterday, Samuel King, Esq; was elected Mayor; as were Thomas Backus and William Roche, Esqrs. Sheriffs, for the ensuing year, who gave an elegant entertainment on the occasion, at the new assembly rooms.

A letter from a gentleman in London, to his friend in this city, mentions, that Laurence Kennedy, Comedian, formerly belonging to the Theatres of Smock Alley and Crow-street, labouring under some disorder of mind, cut his throat in Hyde-park, and afterwards jumped into the canal; a gentleman riding by at the time saved him for the moment and had him conducted to an Hospital, where he languished for a few days, and expired on Thursday last, the cause of this rash action is attributed to the indigence of his circumstances.

John Parker, Thomas Furnell, Esq; and the inhabitants of the parish of Fedacunda, so worthy of imitation in refusing to join with, and resolving to resist, all attempts that might be made by those daring Insurgents who have so long disturbed the Peace of this Country, to induce them to join in those outrages so disgraceful to this Province, and which are likely to prove fatal to many of those deluded men.—Our warmest thanks are also due to the Rev. John Parker, for acting like a Worthy and Prudent Magistrate, in calling for the assistance of the Military, on Sunday the 25th of June last, and to those Gentlemen who assisted him in apprehending many of the Insurgents on that day assembled at Fedamore, and we are resolved to protect the above mentioned Gentlemen at the hazard of our lives and fortunes, against the resentment of these misguided Men. We also request that Lieutenant Saunders and Cornet Gale, the non-commissioned officers and Privates of his Majesty's 8th Regiment of Light Dragoons, will accept our thanks for their cool and determined behaviour on every occasion.  
 Resolved, That it was originally intended to take into consideration at this Meeting, the Grievances that are alleged to exist, but that the Outrageous Proceedings of the Insurgents still continuing, prevent us from entering upon the Subject at present.

 Resolved, That the Thanks of this Meeting be given to our Worthy High Sheriff, for his care and attention to the preservation of the Peace of this County, and for his very proper Conduct in the Chair.
