**Meeting of the Corporation of Kilkenny on Monday.** Charles Butler, Representative of that city in Parliament, chosen Mayor; and John Keough and Henry Esqrs. were re-elected Sheriffs of the County of Kilkenny for the year ensuing the 29th of September next.

**KILKENNY, June 29.**  
 Yesterday, as three boys were playing in a sand pit near the light house, the bank fell in, and buried the children. An inquest was held on the bodies of the unfortunate children by Messrs. Colles and Keough, Esqrs.—Verdict, Accidental Death.

Yesterday, an inquest was held at Coolgraney before Mr. Esq. County Coroner, and a respectable body of Michael Farrell, who died on the preceding day. It appeared in evidence that the deceased had been taken to his Well on Monday, formerly a place of great sanctity, and that he had been set upon by a number of men and beaten in so dreadful a manner as to occasion his death. No evidence having appeared as to the actual murderer, the jury brought in a verdict—Willful murder of a person or persons unknown.

On coming to a bye cross road, the women were alarmed to hear the fellow who drove the car that followed give a loud whistle, and immediately the driver of the car on which they rode turned into the cross road, when one of the young women, alarmed at such a proceeding, and seeing a house near, leaped off the jingle and ran for shelter into the house; the young woman that remained in the jingle kept entreating the fellow to let her get down all the time; This occasioned him to whip his horse and go faster, still followed by the second car.—When they reached a gravel pit, in a retired place, the two ruffians forced her off the car into it, and in a little time five more joined them, where they treated her in the most brutal and outrageous manner. In a word, she was found, after the monsters had left her, almost lifeless, and continued until the following Wednesday in a state of debility and agony that precluded all possibility of her attending any Magistrate to give informations of the outrage offered her. Some part of the nefarious transaction, however, reaching the Magistrates of Duke Street Office every necessary inquiry was made respecting it. Mr. Magrath called, in person on the injured young woman, took her depositions, and set on foot a most active search after the delinquents. Two men were apprehended, one of whom, Benjamin Healy, was fully identified by the young women, to be the fellow who had driven the first jingle, and who was, of course, one of the principals in the outrage.
