Last Wednesday a desperate skirmish hap pened between thirty of the Volunteers and upwards of fix hundred White Boys, near Inchigeelagh, in this county, in which three of the latter were killed on the fpot, two drowned in endeavouring to make their escape across a river, feveral wounded, and nine taken prifoners, who were conducted to this city, and fafely lodged in the county gaol yesterday morning, by twelve of the above Volunteers, affifted by the like number of his Majesty's Light Dragoons.

Last Friday about 600 of those deladed wretches called White Boys, all armed, attacked Col. Cox, at the head of a party of the Dunmanway Rangers, and a few of the 13th Light Dragoons, near Iveleary, to prevent their going to the protection of Mr. Barry, of Kilbarry, when a general engagement commenced, in which three of the White Boys were killed feveral wounded, and a quantity of fire arms were taken from them. Happily none of the Volunteers or Dragoons received the least injury. Twenty of the affailants were taken prisoners, and lodged in gaol at Bandon.

The above corps conducted yesterday to our Co Gaol, twelve White Boys, concerned in anany riotous and unlawful proceedings prior to the above, and three persons for the murder of the Rev. Mr. Madden, whose names are in the following committal.

Yesterday after the above White-Boys, and persons accused of murder were lodged in the South Goal, a most violent and unprovoked attack was made on Meffrs, William M'Cabe. A most dangerous set of Coiners have frequented the town and neighbourhood of Newport, Co.
