Cork, July 3. This day at a Court of D'Oyer Hundred at the Guild Hall of this city came on the election of Magistrates for the ensuing year, when the names of all the resident Burgeses were put into an hat, the five following were drawn out:

whereupon Samuel Rowland, Esq; was elected Mayor. They then proceeded to the appointment of Sheriffs, when Christopher Waggett and Christopher Allen, Esqrs. were elected.

Last Wednesday a desperate skirmish happened between thirty of the Volunteers and upwards of six hundred White Boys, near Inchigeelagh, in this county, in which three of the latter were killed on the spot, two drowned in endeavouring to make their escape across a river, several wounded, and nine taken prisoners, who were conducted to this city, and safely lodged in the county gaol yesterday morning, by twelve of the above Volunteers, assisted by the like number of his Majesty's Light Dragoons.

Last Friday about 600 of those deluded wretches called White Boys, all armed, attacked Col. Cox, at the head of a party of the Dunmanway Rangers, and a few of the 13th Light Dragoons, near Iveleary, to prevent their going to the protection of Mr. Barry, of Kilbarry, when a general engagement commenced, in which three of the White Boys were killed several wounded, and a quantity of fire arms were taken from them. Happily none of the Volunteers or Dragoons received the least injury. Twenty of the assailants were taken prisoners, and lodged in gaol at Bandon.

The above corps conducted yesterday to our Co Gaol, twelve White Boys, concerned in many riotous and unlawful proceedings prior to the above, and three persons for the murder of the Rev. Mr. Madden, whose names are in the following committal.

Yesterday after the above White-Boys, and persons accused of murder were lodged in the South Goal, a most violent and unprovoked attack was made on Messrs. William M'Cabe, Timothy Sullivan and John White, belonging to the Dunmanway Volunteers, by a number of riotous persons, who knocked them down in the South Main-street, after they had laid up their fire arms; and were it not for the spirited activity of Mr. Gibbs Ross, Ranger of this County, they had been

A most dangerous set of Coiners have frequented the town and neighbourhood of Newport, Co. Tipperary, for some weeks past; the Chief Magistrate of said town Mr. Bloomfield being unwell, Mr. White of Newross, and the principal inhabitants from home, and no information given to any other Magistrate, gave them an opportunity of proceeding with great success in their business. At the hour of twelve o'clock on Tuesday night last, information being given Mr White at his return home, of those fellows being at work at a house in Newport, he immediately went there with his son Captain White, called on Messrs. Smyth and Russell of said town, and in less than one hour detected two of the Coiners in the actual progress of their business; on whom Mr. White found all their implements with a great quantity of different powdered ingredients, and several bottles of different liquors, for their purpose; those fellows go by the names of John Griffin and Mathias M'Donnel, and say they are from the neighbourhood of Ablone, their Coin are Guineas of George the 3d date 1774, amazingly well executed, they dont weigh more than standing beam, they have circulated at the different fairs above three hundred of them, a good many of those at the last fair of Limerick, from whence they returned that night, their Cash keeper, whose name we cannot immediately find out, did not arrive to them at the time of the detection; their Guinea are rather of a pale colour, and the head when compared to a good one does not appear to be the same breadth, the edge quite rough, and the whole so executed as not to be suspected, it is said many of the farmers are taken in, as those fellows agreement was to give them three guineas for one guinea and one dollar, many of whom
