A negociation we hear is on foot at Rome to facilitate the reception of Ambassadors from Protestant Princes and States, Pope Pius VI having determined, as a temporal Prince, to receive them at his court, dispencing with all the forms and etiquette that hitherto prevented them from appearing there. The present Pontiff, like his predecessor Ganganelli, possesses an enlightened and liberal mind, and withes, with true apostolic fuavity, to do away, as far as possible, the adverse distinctions that exist among the various members of the Christian Church.

It is rumoured at Paris, that the French Cabinet has proposed to the English Minister a plan for the partition of India, as the ground of a permanent alliance between the two nations .- This is intended to be at the expence of the Dutch; and France supposes England will accede to the propofal from a refentment of the conduct of Holland in the late war. The Dutch departed from their usual caution and prudence in renouncing the friendship of England. They interposed in a quarrel, when every intelligent European perceived that the discontented Colonies must necessarily be independent; and when it must be evident, that every advantage of the American trade must foon be acquired by the more industrious nations, without the difcredit of unneighbourly interference, or the rifque and charge of actual hoffilities.

On the evening of Thursday the 22d ult. there was in the neighbourhood of Newry a very great florm of thunder and lightning for two hours, attended with torrents of rain About a mile out of town, towards Armagh, the lightning entered the chimney of a small house, where two men and three women were fitting.
